



How is a midwife different from an OB/Gyn?

A midwife specialized in low-risk pregnancies, and focuses on optimal health and prevention of common problems. Her training and experience allow her to optimize the health of both mom and baby, ensure their continued safety, and recognize when problems arise. Midwives follow a model of care that views pregnancy and birth as a normal life event that does not require routine intervention.

The midwives at The Natural BirthHouse are Certified Professional Midwives (CPM) who are licensed by the Louisiana State Board of Medical Examiners.

How is a birth center different from a hospital?

Birth centers are equipped to provide you with the same standard of care as physicians' offices and hospitals, but in a more private, supportive, home-like environment. The ample one-on-one time spent with the midwives helps to ensure a highly individualized experience and maximum comfort during labor and birth.

Who can use a birth center?

Birth centers are a safe option for women with low-risk pregnancies The Louisiana State Board of Medical Examiners set the standards of what is considered low-risk, and what situations require transfer of care to a physician. (Sadly, the LSBME does not currently allow midwives to attend VBACs out of the hospital).

Is out-of-hospital birth safe?

Yes. Birth centers are recognized as a safe alternative to the hospital birth for healthy, low-risk pregnancies.

Studies like this one show that low-risk births attended by licensed midwives have equal or better outcomes with fewer interventions when compared to similar births in the hospital.

A midwife can recognize and treat many common issues that may arise during pregnancy, labor, and birth, and can assist in obtaining necessary medical care through collaborative treatment with a physician and/or nearby hospital.



During labor, midwives monitor both mother and baby, and can provide things like IV fluids, antihemorrhagic medications, oxygen, resuscitation, and suturing. If an emergency does arise, or if mother or baby requires more extensive medical attention, the midwifes and staff are prepared to initiate a timely and efficient transfer to a local hospital.



Yes, we have emergency medical equipment!

(We just don't use any of it "routinely")

- IV fluids
- Oxygen, suction and resuscitation equipment
- Antihemorrhagic drugs (for afterbirth bleeding)
- Lidocaine and suturing material
- Vitamin K and eye ointment for the baby, IV antibiotics for Group B Strep, and more..

How do I become a client at the birth center?

(As easy at 1,2,3)

- 1. See OB and complete initial prenatal lab work
- 2. Schedule 30-minute consultation(can be scheduled before OB appointment)
- 3. Schedule initial visit at The Natural BirthHouse and become officially accepted into care!



Can I switch to the birth center if I'm already seeing an OB? Do I need my OB's permission to switch?

Yes, you may switch into midwifery care if you are already seeing an OB. Your midwife will become your primary healthcare provider for your pregnancy on the day of your initial visit. It is okay if your OB is not supportive of you switching to a midwife. We have OBGYNs to consult with you if you were to need a physician evaluation for any reason. Your OB will allow you to return to their care AFTER the birth.

When is it too late to transfer into care?

We prefer clients to transfer in early pregnancy, around 12-16 weeks. However, we realize you may be further along and want to transfer now. Although there is no limit on how late you can transfer into care, we do need time to obtain your medical records, review and perform your initial visit.

Transfers after 30 weeks will only be accepted if you have had routine prenatal care beforehand.





Can I switch to the birth center if I'm already seeing an OB? Do I need my OB's permission to switch?



Prenatal care with midwives is very different than traditional prenatal care from OBGYNs. Often there is very little, if any, wait time. Your appointment will consist of unrushed 30 minute one-on-one time with your midwife. Children and family members are always welcome to join you and even participate in the experience. By the time you deliver your baby, you will have spent several hours of direct one-on-one time with your midwives.

Who will be at my birth?

No strangers at your birth!



During your labor, you will be attended by one midwife and one birth assistant. We will make efforts to arrange for you to meet your birth assistant during your pregnancy, when possible.

The midwife is responsible for your care throughout your entire time with us, but may delegate skill-appropriate tasks to the birth assistant such as taking blood pressure, assisting you with breastfeeding, etc...

We strongly encourage you to hire a doula for labor support for your birth.

What is provided for the baby?

- Complete head-to-toe newborn exam including weight, length, reflexes, etc...
- Vitamin K and Erythromycin Eye ointment
- Pediatric Referral
 - This includes all of the information your pediatrician will want to know about your pregnancy, lab test, the birth and your newborn at the initial visit
- PKU and Hearing screen
 - State mandated testing
- Glucose testing (if needed)
- Blood type and RH, along with other testing that may be required for babies born to Rh-mothers (cord blood)
- Birth Certificate and social security number
- Weight checks and breast feeding assessments for 6 weeks
- Also, for mothers who test positive for Group B Strep, we do provide antibiotic prophylaxis during labor as recommended by CDC

What kind of care will my baby and I receive after delivery?

After the birth, you will remain in our care for up to 6 hours and then will be discharged from the birth center to return home. The midwives will be connecting with you frequently via a mixture of phone calls and HOME VISIT appointments on days 1, 2, 3, 7-10 and 6 weeks postpartum. These first weeks with baby are so important and additional appointments can be made if necessary to ensure a supported transition (no extra charge).

During this time the midwife will perform health assessments for you and your healthy newborn. In addition, she can provide breastfeeding support and can make referrals if necessary.

What happens if I transfer out of your care?

A birth center is a place for low-risk deliveries. Our midwives perform ongoing risk assessments to ensure you receive appropriate healthcare throughout your time with us. Should risk-factors arise you will be transferred to a physician or hospital. The financial aspects of this are outlined in your financial contract, but basically you are only billed for the services provided up to the time of transfer. If you are transferred during the labor/birth, the midwife will remain with you. All clients > 37 weeks will receive postpartum care from our midwives, even if a hospital transfer was required.

What hospital do you use for transfers? What is the distance?

We are located between the two major hospitals with labor & delivery and NICU availability. Each is about 6 miles of less (10-15 minutes) from the birth center.

This is great because clients may choose their preferred hospital in the instance a transfer would be required. Your preferred hospital will be chosen at your initial visit as part of your Emergency Care Plan.

In the instance of a rare birth emergency, the American College of Obstetrics & Gynecologists (ACOG) recommends "30 minutes from decision to incision" and the American Academy of Pediatrics Pediatrics

(AAP) recommends "20 minutes for maximal patient safety.



Our birth center is well within these recommended timeframes!

Insurance, Fees and Discounts:

The typical uncomplicated hospital birth cost more than \$15,000! In addition to paying your physician during pregnancy, you should expect a variety of in and out-of-network bills to trickle in after the birth.

These bills include:

- Hospital Delivery Fee
- Labs and medication fees
- Separate bills from the anesthesiologist and possible nurse anesthetist in addition to the medications (epidural)
- Newborn care fees
- Pediatrician in-hospital visit fee
- Postpartum car expenses

This is an actual hospital bill for an uncomplicated vaginal birth in Acadiana in 2016. It does NOT include the fee this mom has already paid to the physician, nor the newborn care fees.

We too will bill your insurance, but you will not be getting any surprise bills from us!


As usual, what you personally pay depends on your coverage, deductibles, co-insurance, etc.. After the consultation, we can do a verification of benefits with your insurance company to get your specific fee schedule.

If you do not have maternity insurance, we will pay our affordable **flat rate cash-pay** fee.



Most families will pay less out of pocket at our birth center than for a comparative hospital birth

We can help compare the costs for you! Please be sure to fill out a Verification of Benefits form to obtain your quote.





Your fee includes:

30-60 minute appointments for complete prenatal, birth and postpartum care including home visits as well as nutritional counseling, risk assessment, some diagnostic testing, birth preparation, newborn care education, birth certificate filing, breastfeeding support and family planning consultation. Your birth assistant and birth supply kit are also covered.

It does not include:

Fees for lab work, doulas, ultrasound(s), physician consultation, non-emergent medications, hospital care, emergency transportation or the cost of a few supplies you are asked to purchase for your birth.

How payments work:

- \$50 Consultation Fee (applied towards total fee)
- \$500 Initial Visit Fee (applied towards total fee)
- \$200 minimum payment at each visit until balance is paid


